Introduction		Landcare Australia's Junior Landcare program has always recognised the vital role children and young people play in caring for the natural environment. Through its campaigns, grant programs and educational resources, Junior Landcare provides children the opportunity to play an active role in ensuring the safe future of their environment. This includes the online Junior Landcare Learning Centre, which contains a library of free resources for educators, including learning activities with curriculum and framework links written by environmental educators; videos to explain the activities to students; educator notes and activity sheets; as well as access to a like-minded online community. First Nations Perspectives is one of four key themes around which these activities are based. The other three themes are Biodiverisity, Food Production and Waste Management. The objective of the First Nations Perspectives learning activities - created				

by First Nations educator Adam Shipp in collaboration with environmental educator, Sam Harrison - is to give educators the tools they need to run projects about cultural heritage, Indigenous seasons, Traditional land management, or creating a Yarning Circle, in a hands-on, immersive fashion.

Educators who attend Adam's presentation will leave the room feeling equipped and confident to be able to run hands-on First Nations Perspectives projects in their school or early learning centre, as well as how to do so in a manner that builds meaningful relationships with First Nations community members and/or organisations.

Join First Nations educator and proud Wiradjuri man, Adam Shipp, for a hands-on workshop to explore and experience the First Nations Perspectives educational resources available in the Junior Landcare Learning Centre. For the past 25 years, Landcare Australia's Junior Landcare program has provided children with the opportunity to play an active role in caring for the natural environment, with a key focus on: sustainable food production, waste management, biodiversity and First Nations perspectives. This includes a range of hands-on learning activities available in the Junior Landcare learning centre — an online platform with over 60 curriculum-linked activities developed to inspire and support educators to provide hands-on environmental education to children of all ages.


