Introduction		This combination presentation and workshop will use a holistic approach to highlight the importance of Indigenous knowledges of envrionment, science, and art to listen to and heal Country in Australia. Beginning with the presentation, we will speak to the background to our three research areas and then explore the ways that they are connected. Then we will move to our outdoor workshop, where we will listen to Country				

	to identify its needs and how we can collectively work to heal it. We will finish the workshop by utilising healthy components of Country to create and connect through Indigenous art practice. Participants will leave this presentation and workshop with a greater understanding of the role they play as individuals, community members, and educators in listening to and healing Country
Presentation Abstract: max. 300 words	Led by three First Nations women, this presentation and workshop propose a three-step approach to highlight Indigenous knowledge of environment, science, and art to listen to and heal Country in Australia. Indigenous environmental protection movements, listening to Country to identify its specific needs, and utilising Country's healthy components to create and connect through Indigenous art practices are all closely interwoven aspects of an overall obligation to care for and connect to Country. This presentation and workshop advocate for sustainable and ethical practices that do not cause harm but instead benefit the environment and Indigenous people. A harmonious, holistic relationship with the land is necessary to achieve this goal, emphasising the interconnectedness of Indigenous epistemology and the idea that to look after Country is to look after self and family. This presentation and workshop make clear the necessity of integration of Indigenous knowledge systems and environmental education to create a sustainable future. Ultimately, by exploring Indigenous perspectives on sovereignty through a holistic environmental education model, participants will leave this presentation and workshop with a greater understanding of their role as individuals, community members, and educators in listening to and healing Country in partnership with Indigenous peoples.
