Format of Presentation	A guided walk on Country
<b>Dialogue Intention</b> Max. 150 words	The intention of the dialogue is to use creative relationalities with Country as a way of developing a critical sensitivity and responsibility to collectively address ecological challenges, both current and emerging. It draws links between Country's ability to strengthen diversity and relationships, and, emphasises the notion we are all composed of diverse elements, offering us the creative capacity to reassemble ourselves into a collective, similar to Country's adaptability to challenges. The dialogue seeks to foster contemplation among participants about shared worlds and experiences between humans, non-humans, and more-than-humans. Themes such as freedom, mobility, and fragility will be explored through the act of collective creativities, with the intention of embedding ourselves into place and fostering a sense of responsibility.
<b>Dialogue Format</b> Max. 150 words	We focus on the lessons Country has to offer within the local context of the University of Wollongong campus, a place where native, non-native, and exotic species coexist. It is through this lens that the importance of exploring various ways of belonging and contributing to a place becomes apparent. The dialogue involves a collective journey, beginning on campus and walking towards Mt Keira. Throughout the journey, the focus will be on participant reflexivity in relationship with Country. There will be opportunities for participants to gather for collective creativities in response to a provocation. The co-convenors will share their knowledge and experiences of Mt Keira, offering perspectives from both Indigenous and Western cultures. Together, the group will explore the notion of an imagined future that harmoniously combines elements from these cultures, and the role that we as researcher have in realising this future.
